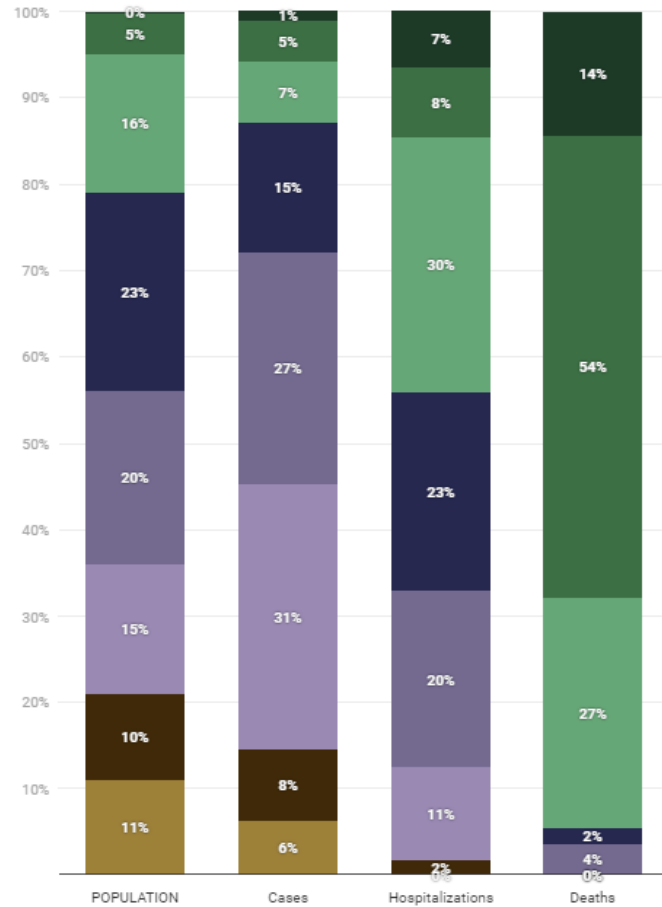
This information shows how COVID-19 has impacted Marin County community residents since the first case. None of the data in this section include San Quentin inmates.

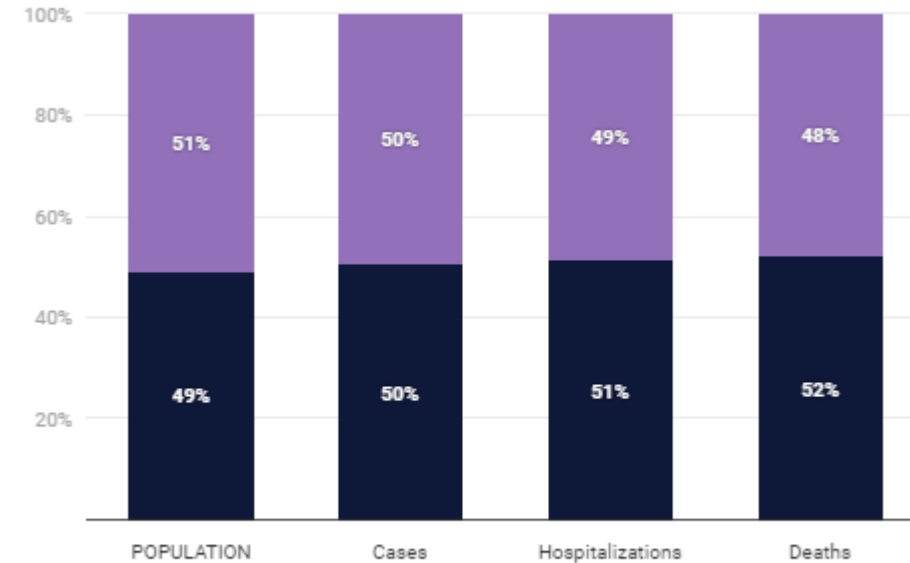

Male Female



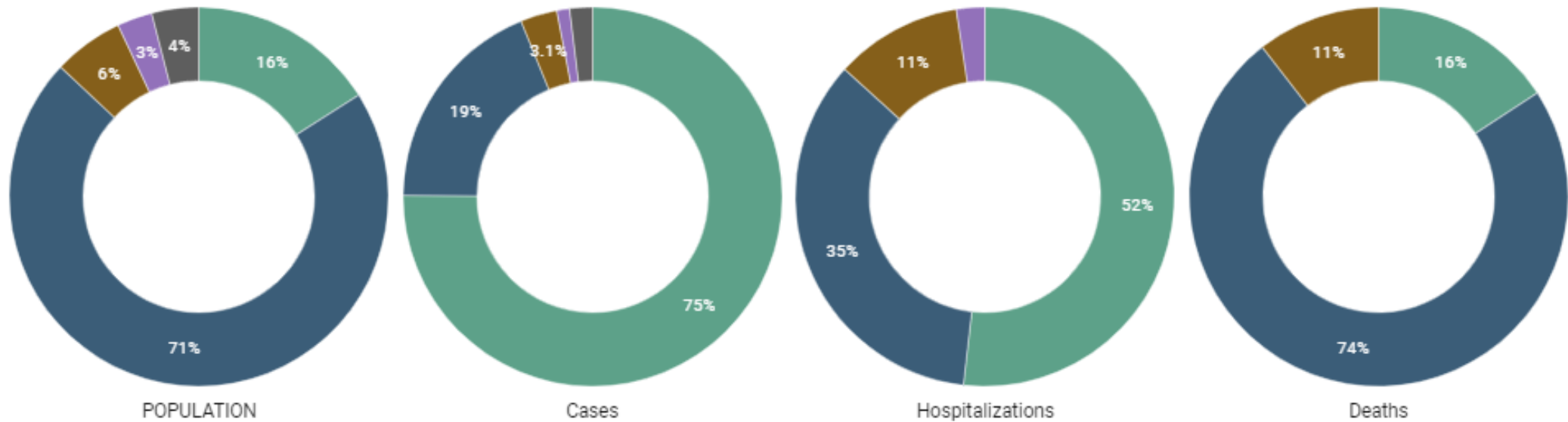

 ■ Other

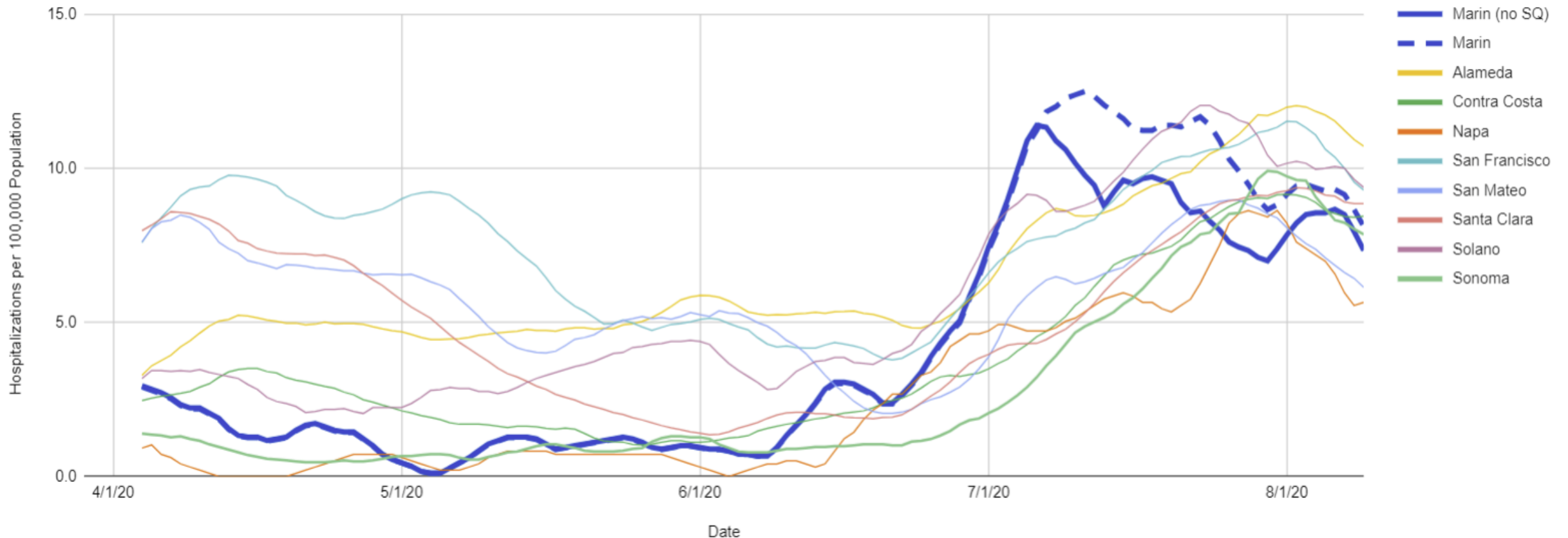

# Shelter in Place Order

- CDPH County Monitoring list
  - Greater than 100 cases per 100K residents over past two weeks
  - Sets limits on what we can open and when
- August 11
  - Personal services, outdoor only
    - Nail salon, massage, aesthetician, facials
    - Not tattoos or body piercing
- August 24
  - Hotels and short-term rentals
    - If county wide incidence is below 200 cases per 100K residents for prior week weeks on August 21
- Alignment with state order for counties on monitoring list

# Schools

- Due to status on Monitoring list unable to open to classroom-based learning
  - >100 cases/100K over 2 weeks
- State allows opening with approval of local Public Health Officer and CDPH
- Waiver application
  - Adherence to MCPH/MCOE recommendations for reopening
  - School Site specific protection plan
  - COVID-19 Testing capacity
  - Priority
    - Those that can optimize outdoor space
    - Demonstrated commitment to educational equity
- Earliest September 8

# Schools

- Equity concerns
  - 2020/21 school year could widen unacceptable inequities in education
  - Distance learning disproportionately hurts low income families
  - Public school are less likely to apply for waivers to open than private schools
  - Families of means are finding alternatives in ad hoc learning pods with instruction
  - Unstructured out-of-classroom arrangements can increase risk of transmission
- Opportunity
  - Drive down prevalence to allow all school to open
  - Ensure waiver application process supports equity
  - Support out-of-classroom educational structure for low income children
- Educational Equity Task Force



# Childcare, Camps, and Youth Activities



3-week stable cohorts (15 or fewer children)



No minimum day requirements



Children may not attend more than **two** childcare or youth programs simultaneously.



Updated face covering guidance



Outdoor Activities

# Safe and Healthy Environments



Home-based symptom screening



Hand washing



Teach and reinforce mandatory use of cloth face coverings among all staff and children / youth



Cleaning and disinfection



Open doors and windows (if safe).



*Sanitize the sink and toilet handles frequently*



Teach children proper hand hygiene after toilet use.



# Face Covering

- Personnel must wear a facial covering over their nose and mouth unless specifically exempted from doing so by the Health Officer's Order for Face Coverings.
- Face coverings are strongly encouraged for young children between two years old and second grade, if they can be worn properly.
- Face coverings are required for children in 3<sup>rd</sup> grade through high school. Face covering should be removed for meals, snacks, naptime, or outdoor recreation.
- Children under 12 wearing a cloth face covering shall always be actively monitored by Personnel. Teach and reinforce mandatory use of cloth face coverings among all staff.
